Attractions

Monuments, Architecture, and Relaxing Spots

No Bavarian city boasts more historical buildings relative to its inhabitants than Fürth – **over 2,000** – the most famous and striking being the town hall and the theatre. The grand boulevards, lined with Art Nouveau and Historicist buildings, evoke the era of the first German railway. The municipal park, with its rose garden, the church Auferstehungskirche, and its fountain courtyard, is the perfect place for a relaxed stroll, no matter the season. And, of course, the Old Town with the famous Gustavstraße and its half-timbered and slate houses is a must-see during your visit. We recommend the "**Lauschtour-App**" (see p. 37), which allows you to access information about sights on the spot and listen to it whenever you like.

1 Rathaus (Town Hall)

A Touch of Florence

The Fürth Town Hall rises majestically above the city, serving as an iconic landmark, unparalleled in its size and striking architecture throughout the region. The building was constructed between 1840 and 1850 according to plans by Friedrich Bürklein. The structure embodies the identity of the up-and-coming industrial city and is located along its primary thoroughfare, Königstraße. Highlights inside include the neoclassical staircase and the council chamber, with its neo-renaissance decor. Its 55-metre square tower, the city's landmark, was inspired by the Palazzo Vecchio in Florence.

Interesting: Every day at 12:04 a.m., the bells in the tower chime the Led Zeppelin song "Stairway to Heaven".

2 Grand Boulevards

Magnificent, Historic, Remarkable

The two magnificent boulevards, Hornschuchpromenade and Königswarterstraße, form a unique heritage-listed ensemble in southern Germany and are a prime example of Fürth's "Belle Époque".

It is no coincidence that from 1883 to 1904, such stately homes were built right in this place. The space between the historic sandstone houses was once used by the Ludwig Railway – the first railway in Germany – which ran between Nuremberg and Fürth. The architecture of the street is primarily characterised by historicist and Art Nouveau buildings.

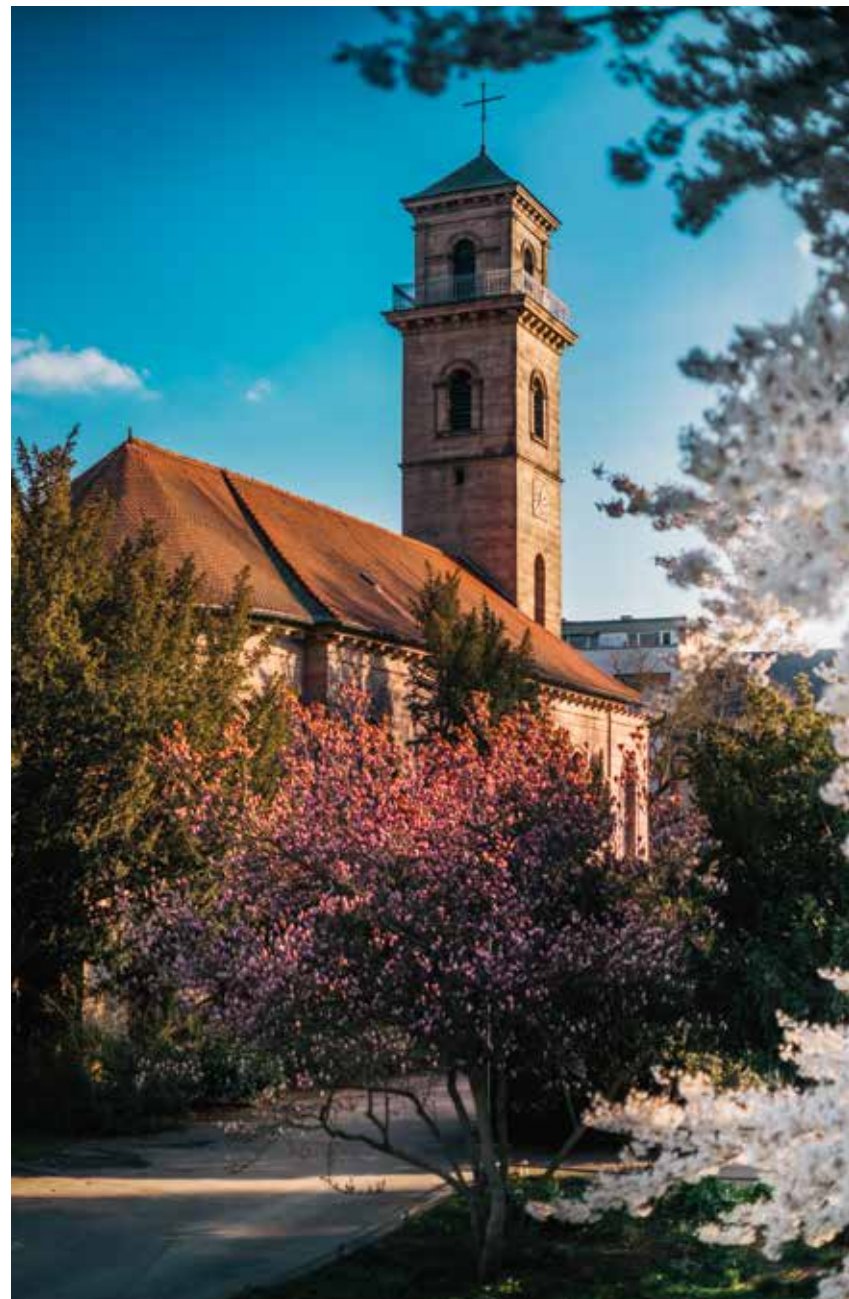




③ Stadtpark (Municipal Park)

The Green Heart of the City

The municipal park, often referred to as 'Fürth's secret love', is known as a haven of peace and relaxation. It was redesigned by municipal garden director Hans Schiller in 1951 for a horticultural show. Among its many highlights are the impressive open-air stage and the enchanting fountain courtyard. Particularly beautiful spots include the vibrant sea of flowers in the reception garden of the Auferstehungskirche (Church of the Resurrection), the rose garden, the grand Hans-Schiller-Allee, and the charming municipal school garden. Thanks to its beautiful location, the Stadtparkcafé is a popular meeting point.

4 Old Town

Explore the Fürth Way of Life

With its quaint courtyards, historic half-timbered houses, and cobble streets, the Old Town exudes a nostalgic charm that captivates not only locals but also visitors from near and far. Until the early modern period, Fürth's urban area was primarily concentrated around St Michael's Church. Today, the Old Town is home to a variety of cosy cafés, traditional restaurants, and small shops, inviting visitors to linger and explore.

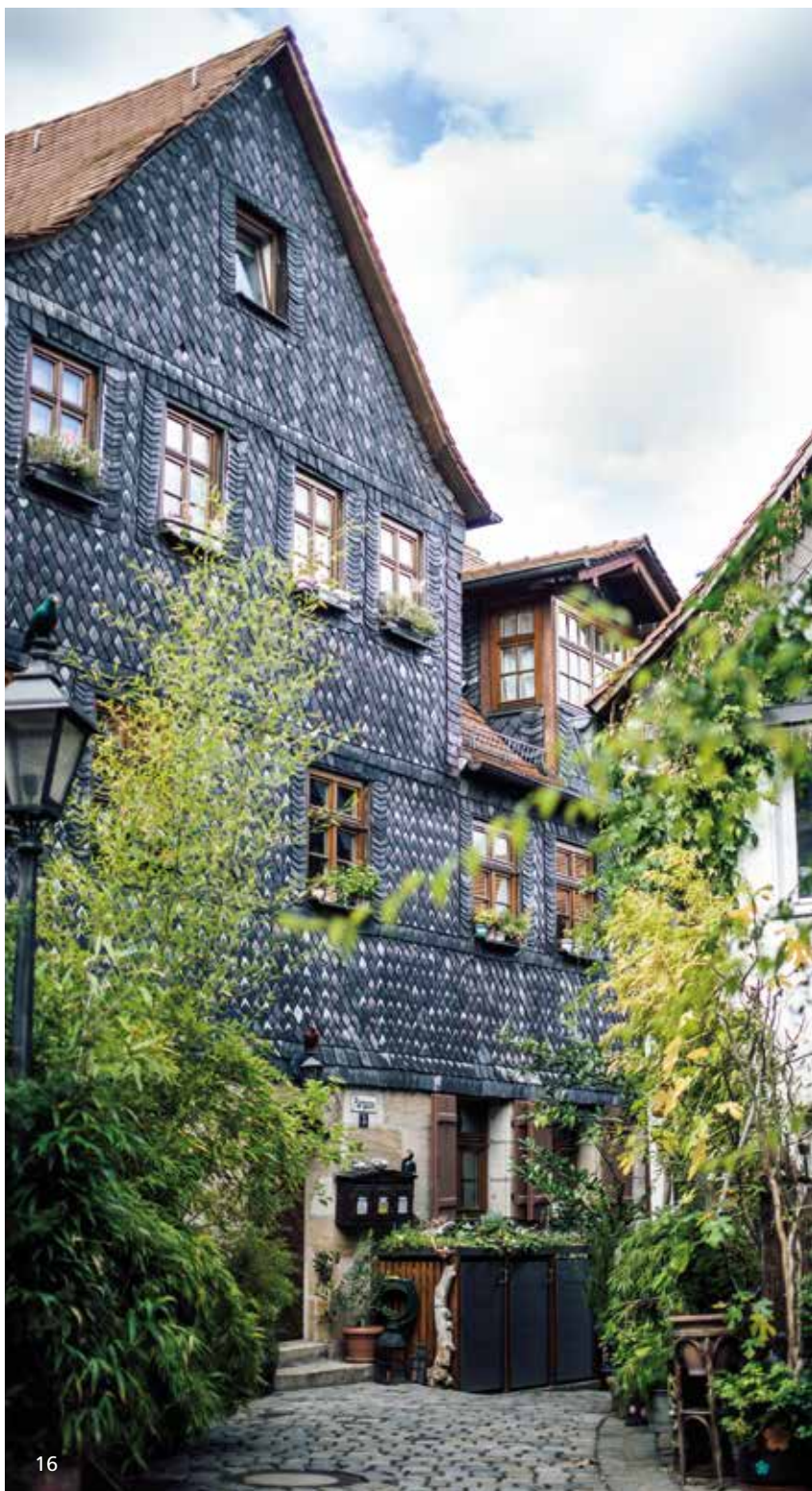


5 Kirche St. Michael (Church of St. Michael)

The Church of St. Michael is the oldest still-preserved building in Fürth. The origins of this fortified church date back to 1100. As befitted the erstwhile small market town, Church of St. Michael is just a simple village church. The tower with its west portal, the chancel, and the south entrance are typical elements from the Gothic period. The interior was redesigned in the neo-Gothic style in the 19th century. The only remaining old piece of art is the sandstone sacrament house built around 1500.

6 Gustavstraße

Gustavstraße has always been one of the most important streets in the Old Town. Nowadays, it is the heart of the pub scene and a popular meeting point, especially in the evening. No two houses are the same here. There is a great variety of roof shapes, heights, styles, and facade designs. One of the highlights is the baroque sandstone building of the restaurant Grüner Baum. Swedish King Gustav Adolf is said to have stayed here in 1632. In addition to its diverse selection of restaurants and bars, Gustavstraße is also perfect for strolling and browsing through the small independent shops and studios.



7 Waagplatz

Surrounded by picturesque half-timbered houses, the square invites visitors to relax and watch the bustle of the city. Here, you'll not only find Fürth's smallest house but also the former Freibank, whose rooms are nowadays used by the Old Town Association. During the Christmas season, the Old Town Christmas Market takes place here.

8 Pfarrgasse

Pfarrgasse is one of the most beautiful and best-preserved alleys in Fürth's Old Town. It is slightly hidden between Kirchplatz around Church of St. Michael and Obere Fischerstraße. A small detour is definitely worth it.

9 **Stadttheater Fürth (Municipal Theatre)**

One of the most magnificent buildings in Fürth is the Municipal Theatre, built by the famous Viennese architects Hellner and Fellner in the neo-Baroque style in 1902. Portrait medallions of Mozart and Schiller, together with busts of Wagner, Beethoven, Goethe, and Lessing, on the lateral faces used to indicate the building's function as a theatre and opera house. The auditorium is in the neo-Rococo style.



10 **Berolzheimianium – Comödie Fürth**

In 1904, the Jewish pencil manufacturer and honorary citizen of Fürth Heinrich Berolzheimer donated this magnificent building. For many decades, it served as a community centre and public library, offering workers access to books. For over 25 years, the renovated Art Nouveau building has been the venue of the Comödie Fürth and, more recently, the home of the Grüner Brauhaus.



11 **Centaurenbrunnen (Centaur Fountain)**

In 1890, Fürth's first artistic fountain was created by Rudolf Maison as a monument to the first German railway (1835) and the establishment of the central water supply (1887). It depicts man's harnessing of the forces of nature. The imposing fountain attracts visitors' attention at Bahnhofplatz.

12 **Old Jewish Cemetery**

This is where the Jewish community buried its dead between 1607 and 1906. Jewish graves are created for eternity, and their peace must not be disturbed. Despite acts of desecration during the Nazi period, the cemetery, which covers 20,000 sqm, continues to be one of the most impressive stone testaments of Jewish life in Fürth. The cemetery is closed and can only be visited as part of a public guided tour.

From opposite the car park on Uferstraße, you can look over the wall and see part of the cemetery from the outside.



13 **Kißkalt Houses and Uferpromenade (Riverside Promenade)**

The Kißkalt Houses, built in 1898/99, stand out with their facing brick construction, which contrasts with the otherwise dominant sandstone in the area. Together with the nearby river Rednitz, the beautiful river promenade, and the lush green meadows on the opposite bank, they create a truly unique atmosphere. A visit to this picturesque spot is highly recommended, especially on warm summer or sunny autumn days. In designated areas, you can cool off with a swim in the Rednitz and indulge in a treat at the café in the cultural venue at Badstraße 8.





14 **Fürther Freiheit and Fürth Market**

This is where Germany's first railway, the Adler, arrived in 1835. The Ludwig Railway operated until 1922. In 1938, the old station building was demolished. Today, the historic square is mostly used as a car park and a venue for various events. Right next to it, the modern daily market sells fresh fruit, vegetables, and lots of tasty delicacies.



15 **Paradiesbrunnen (Paradise Fountain)**

Since 1955, the Paradise Fountain has stood on the Dr.-Max-Grundig-Anlage, named after its founder. It was designed by the artist couple Barbara and Gernot Rumpf. The fountain depicts the Garden of Eden with a human couple, several paradisiacal animals, a natural tree, and spouting water features. A true paradise for children!



16 **Logenhaus der Freimaurerloge (Freemasons' Lodge House)**

The prominent historicist building of the Fürth Masonic lodge was constructed in 1890/91 by Nuremberg architect Leonhard Bürger. The cube-shaped body of the building is abundantly decorated with Masonic symbols. On top of the gable, two female figures represent the lodge's name, "Truth and Friendship". The renovated hall is one of the finest ballrooms in Fürth.





Discover Fürth's Museums

Experience History

Visiting a museum in Fürth is more than just looking at old exhibits in display cases – it's about **experiencing history**, exploring new topics, and immersing yourself in fascinating worlds. A prime example of a modern museum presentation is the Ludwig Erhard Centre. The City Museum offers an impressive insight into Fürth's history and development, while the Jewish Museum of Franconia focuses on the eventful Jewish history of the region. In addition to the small but notable Crime Museum, the Fürth Dialysis Museum is also well worth a visit. The Broadcasting Museum will remain closed for renovations and redesign until 2026. A must-see for contemporary art lovers is the kunst galerie fürth.



17 Stadtmuseum Fürth (Fürth City Museum)

The Stadtmuseum sheds light on the city's development, exploring various aspects such as social and economic history.

Covering more than 800 sqm, the **permanent exhibition** shows Fürth's transformation from a small market town to a modern city. Unique artefacts, documents, photographs, multimedia stations, and even scent stations offer an immersive experience of the city's eventful past, covering industry, craftsmanship, governance, and social history.

An **audio guide** is available in English, offering deeper insights into the city's heritage for individual visitors. Additionally, a **3D headset** allows visitors to embark on a virtual journey through 18th-century Fürth.

18 Ludwig Erhard Zentrum (Ludwig Erhard Center)

The Ludwig Erhard Zentrum (LEZ) in Fürth, with Ludwig Erhard's **birthplace** and a striking **new building** directly opposite, is Germany's only **exhibition, documentation, meeting and research center** that is all about Ludwig Erhard and his concept of the social market economy.

The 1,400 sqm **permanent exhibition** invites visitors to become acquainted with Ludwig Erhard, discover contemporary history and experience the social market economy. The **entire exhibition as well as an audio guide is available in English**. **English tours** can be booked by groups according to their individual requirements.

The **Museum Café Luise**, with its charming retro atmosphere, offers a selection of coffee specialities and delicious cakes.

19 Jüdisches Museum Franken (The Jewish Museum Franconia)

As you step down the worn stone steps, you hear the crunch beneath your feet, and an earthy scent fills the air – in the historic ritual bath of the Jewish Museum of Franconia, the past and present of Jewish life in Franconia become a tangible experience. This is also reflected in the Judaica and everyday objects of the permanent exhibition, the annual temporary exhibitions, and the two historic sukkahs within the museum, housed in the former residence of the Fromm family, Fürth's first Jewish printers.

In the museum's extension, visitors can take a break and enjoy a slice of traditional lemon cake at the **Mary S. Rosenberg Café** or in the **Alfred Heilbronn Museum Garden**. Meanwhile, the **Jakob Wassermann Bookshop** offers a selection of Jewish literature and contemporary Judaica design pieces.

20 kunst galerie fürth (Fürth Art Gallery)

The kunst galerie fürth is a municipal art gallery specialising in **contemporary art**. Each year, it hosts four to five exhibitions that feature individual, group, and themed displays of current art. Both local and **national as well as international** artists are showcased. Alongside each exhibition, a diverse educational programme is offered for all ages.

The gallery invites visitors to explore and engage with contemporary art. Its central location in Fürth ensures easy access, making it a popular destination for art lovers.

23 Wilhelm-Löhe-Haus Fürth (Wilhelm Löhe House)

This museum tells the history of the Lutheran theologian Wilhelm Löhe, who was born here on 21 February 1808. He founded the Deaconess House in Neuen-dettelsau and the Lutheran Missionary School.

22 Kriminalmuseum

In the City Hall's basement, an exhibition area of 200 sqm highlights the history of the Fürth police and jurisdiction since 1806 as well as spectacular criminal cases of the past 200 years. Current police work and crime prevention complete the museum's concept.

24 KfH-Dialysemuseum Fürth (Fürth Dialysis Museum)

The exhibition is located in the KfH Dialysis Centre, which was named after the famous Fürth doctor Jakob Henle. It recounts the historical development of kidney replacement therapy from antiquity to the modern era. Henle's work in general anatomy and pathology is highly valued to this day.

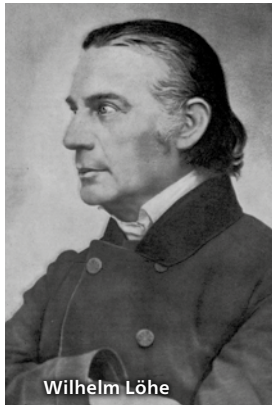
History at Every Turn

Famous Figures and Historic Milestones

The most famous figures from Fürth are likely **Ludwig Erhard**, **Max Grundig**, and **Henry Kissinger**. On the following pages, you'll learn about other notable individuals who lived and worked in Fürth. When visiting, you can follow the Fürth Honour Walk along Mathilden- and Schwabacher Straße. Sixteen bronze plaques embedded in the pavement commemorate Fürth's outstanding personalities.

From the first documented mention of Fürth in 1007, through the era of the "triumvirate" and the first German railway, to the designation of the Fürth Michaelis-Kirchweih as Intangible Cultural Heritage in 2018, our timeline takes you on a journey through the key moments in Fürth's history.

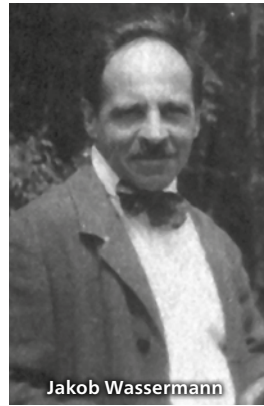

Wilhelm Löhe (1808 – 1872)

The Protestant theologian was born in Fürth. His writings contributed substantially to the perception of the Lutheran Church. He became known as the “Franconian Father of Deaconesses” for founding a motherhouse for deaconesses.

Leopold Ullstein (1826 – 1899)

A native of Fürth, the successful publisher founded the publishing house Ullstein-Verlag in Berlin in 1877. In 1894, Ullstein purchased the Berliner Illustrierte Zeitung, which he developed into Germany’s leading weekly newspaper. After his death, his sons continued the successful business and established the publishing house Ullstein Buchverlag in 1903.

Emilie Lehmus (1841 – 1932)

The Fürth native was the first female student of medicine in Germany and the first female doctor in Berlin.

In 1876, Emilie Lehmus was allowed to settle in Berlin with official consent together with Franziska Tiburtius and established a private practice for women and children.

Jakob Wassermann (1873 – 1934)

The Fürth native was an outstanding German-Jewish writer. Among his most significant works is his autobiography, *Mein Weg als Deutscher und Jude* (1921). Since 1995, the City of Fürth has been awarding the Jakob Wassermann Literary Award every two years.

Ludwig Erhard (1897 – 1977)

The Fürth native is regarded as the father of the social market economy and played a key role in the German “Wirtschaftswunder” (economic miracle). He was Federal Minister of Economics between 1949 and 1963 and Federal Chancellor from 1963 to 1966. The Ludwig Erhard Zentrum offers a comprehensive insight into his life and legacy (p. 25).

Grete und Gustav Schickedanz (1911 – 1994, 1895 – 1977)

Following the American blueprint, Gustav Schickedanz founded the Quelle mail-order company in 1927 with headquarters in Fürth.

It expanded to become the largest mail-order company in Europe, with millions in turnover. After his death, his wife Grete Schickedanz continued to run the company.

Max Grundig (1908 – 1989)

He is considered one of the greatest German business pioneers of the post-war period. In December 1945, Grundig and his team developed the legendary Heinzelmännchen radio construction kit. His electronics enterprise Grundig AG became the largest radio manufacturer in Europe.

Henry Kissinger (1923 – 2023)

Born in Fürth, he emigrated to the USA together with his family at the age of 15. From 1969 to 1973, he served as national security advisor, and from 1973 to 1977, he was U.S. secretary of state. In 1973, he was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize for his efforts to bring peace to Vietnam. Until his passing, he frequently returned to his hometown.

Fürth through the Centuries

793

Legend has it that Fürth was founded by Charlemagne. The royal household probably originated in the 7th/8th century.

1062

King Heinrich IV returns to Fürth the market rights that his father (King Heinrich III) had transferred to Nuremberg between 1039 and 1056 when the latter city was founded.

1314

Burgrave Konrad II (the Pious) of Nuremberg returns the governorship of Fürth to the bishopric of Bamberg.

His successors, the Margraves of Ansbach, reassert their rights. The Free Imperial City of Nuremberg also wants to exercise its authority in Fürth. Disagreements between the members of the resulting "triumvirate" continue into the 18th century.

1632

A battle between Swedish King Gustav II Adolf and the Imperial General Wallenstein takes place at the Alte Veste in Zirndorf.

after 1700

The leading crafts are gold-/metal-beating, mirror making, glass making, spectacle manufacture, carpentry, and woodturning.

1806

Fürth becomes part of Bavaria.

1007

The first confirmed mention of Fürth in a deed of donation from King Heinrich II, giving his property "locum Furti dictum" to the Bamberg cathedral chapter.

1100

Construction of Church of St. Michael begins. For centuries, it remains the only monumental edifice.

1440

Jews settle in Fürth, constructing their own cemetery around 1607 and a synagogue around 1617. A Talmud school exists here from the 17th century to 1824.

1634

During the Thirty Years' War, Fürth is almost completely destroyed.

about 1685

Many immigrants arrive from France and the Netherlands. Emergence of new trades and industries like tobacco manufacture, stocking weaving, silk weaving, weaving of trimmings, silk dyeing, and watchmaking.

1792

Fürth becomes Prussian, thus ending the "triumvirate" (bishopric of Bamberg, Margraves of Ansbach, and Imperial Town of Nuremberg).



1835

The first German railway "Adler" takes to the tracks between Nuremberg and Fürth.

1840 – 1850

Fürth Town Hall is built according to the plans of the brothers Bürklein.

1903

Foundation of the local football club SpVgg Fürth.

1922

In a referendum, 64.8% of citizens vote against being incorporated into Nuremberg.

1950

With a population of more than 100,000, Fürth becomes a city.

1982

Underground connection from Nuremberg to Fürth goes into operation. Extensions: 1985 – Hauptbahnhof (Central Station), 1989 – Stadthalle (Event Hall), 2004 – Klinikum (Fürth Main Hospital), 2007 – Hardhöhe.

2016

Fürth is awarded the title "Fairtrade-Town".

1945

About 11% of the town's buildings are destroyed in the Second World War. The large Jewish community is almost completely wiped out.

2006

Fürth becomes a university city.

2007

Fürth is awarded the title "Science City" by the Free State of Bavaria. The city celebrates its 1000th anniversary.

2018

The Fürth Michaelis Fair is listed in the German inventory of Intangible Cultural Heritage.



City Walks

Fürth's past, attractions, and personalities are well worth looking into. This is particularly true of its many hidden places and lovingly restored courtyards.

Tours in English or other languages like Spanish, French, Polish, Danish, or Czech can be booked for groups.

Culture for Everyone

Theatre, Music Venues, Comedy, and More

The Cloverleaf City is home to many exciting cultural venues, including the **Stadtheater** and the **Comödie Fürth**. But there is more to explore – in the Uferstadt, the Kofferfabrik offers a unique taste of subculture with concerts, plays, exhibitions, and offbeat events that attract a diverse audience. The Kulturforum, formerly the site of the Fürth slaughterhouse, now hosts a diverse array of theatre performances, concerts, readings, and dance events. And, of course, there's the Stadthalle, with its colourful programme of concerts and events.



What's On in Fürth

Fair, Festivals and More

For over 900 years, people from near and far have flocked to Fürth every October for the Michaelis-Kirchweih.

Known as the 'Queen of Franconian Fairs', this festival has even earned a place on the nationwide register of Intangible Cultural Heritage – and we couldn't agree more!

Its special blend of market and traditional fair gives this street festival in the heart of the city a unique charm.

Another highlight is the Jewish Music Today Festival, held every two years and one of Europe's largest festivals of Jewish music. May marks the true start of the city's festival season with the New Orleans Festival and the Open Air at Lindenhain.

From then on, the celebrations come thick and fast: the Fürth Festival, the Green Night, and the Sparda Bank Classic Night.

Twice a year, in June and September, the so-called Grafflmarkt invites flea market lovers to the heart of the old town

Fürth Stadtwald (municipal forest), our local recreation area with wild boar and red deer enclosures, various educational trails, and a fitness trail, is a paradise for hikers. Those who prefer a more relaxed activity can enjoy a game at the golf course or at one of the three mini-golf courses, while the yoga trail near Little Mainau offers pure relaxation. The Fürthermare delights visitors with its fun pool, thermal baths, sauna and fitness areas. What are we missing when talking about sports and Fürth? Of course – football! We are always thrilled to welcome guests to the matches of SpVgg Greuther Fürth. The 'Kleeblatt', as the traditional club is affectionately nicknamed, is a three-time German champion and currently plays in the second division of the German Bundesliga.

Cycling and Hiking

Along the River Regnitz or
in the Footsteps of the Hohenzollerns

The **Regnitz Radweg** offers a delightful cycling tour along the riverside connecting Nuremberg and Bamberg. The route follows the river Pegnitz, which meets the Rednitz at the so-called "Flussdreieck" to form the river Regnitz in Fürth. Within just half an hour, cyclists can reach the municipal forest, with around 25 kilometres of well-maintained and designated cycle paths. History comes to life in an interactive way on the **Hohenzollern Experience Cycle Path**, where you can explore the past through an app (available in German).

For those who enjoy long hikes, the Fürth district with its diverse network of hiking and long-distance trails is the perfect destination! Immerse yourself in the landscape and follow one of the oldest and most beautiful pilgrimage routes in Germany, the **Mittelfränkischer Jakobsweg**. Or explore history along the **Cultural Hiking Trail Hohenzollern**, which passes by the impressive Cadolzburg Castle.

The neoclassical castle of the same name can be admired from the beautiful castle park. Inside the castle, the Fürth City Archive houses its valuable treasures.

Follow the call and "go west", taking you to the **rural district of Fürth**, which is part of the region of Romantic Franconia. Visit Cadolzburg – the former seat of the Hohenzollern royal family – with guided tours of the castle for adults and children. Immerse yourself in the world of pencil production at Faber-Castell, set in a historic atmosphere.

Our top picks for memorable family activities in the district: the climbing forest at Weiherhof, the trampoline park in Langenzenn, and, of course, the famous **PLAYMOBIL FunPark** in Zirndorf, where giant Playmobil figures provide fantastic photo opportunities.

Diverse Cultural Experiences

Are you ready for more? The towns of **Fürth**, **Nuremberg**, **Erlangen**, and **Schwabach** have joined to form a common tourist region offering diverse cultural experiences and events. Thanks to a good network of public transport, you can explore the whole region easily, even without a car.

Just a short distance from Fürth lies the charming town of **Zirndorf**. Another hidden gem for tourists is **Forchheim**, easily accessible by train, with its historic town centre and the famous Kellerwald, where beer culture is highly valued. Not far from here, other popular destinations include **Bamberg**, with its unique old town ensemble, a UNESCO World Heritage Site, and **Rothenburg ob der Tauber**, which captivates visitors with its medieval charm.



Nuremberg

Since 2023, the Fürth City Forest features an inclusive sensory trail. The 150-metre circular route offers visitors the chance to engage their senses and connect with nature through seven interactive stations. An audio guide in easy German language guides you from station to station, with a special version available for blind and visually impaired visitors.

Museums:

The Ludwig Erhard Centre as well as the Stadtmuseum, both certified for accessible travel, are entirely barrier-free.

Tactile City Map:

In Königsstraße, opposite the Town Hall, you will find a tactile city map that allows blind or visually impaired visitors to feel the layout of the Old Town and its landmarks.
